

TravArt is a bilateral research project that links 16 historians, art historians and literary scholars from France and Austria to explore the Habsburg Monarchy jointly from the perspective of a transcultural history of entanglement. The guiding theme is the transfer of material artifacts from one cultural context to another, which will be analyzed in terms of materiality, taste, and consumption. The focus is on processes of decontextualization and recontextualization, mechanism of reception, social distinction and identity, networks, and the formation and overcoming of spaces. TravArt promises new insights into the interconnectedness of the Habsburg Monarchy in the early modern period within European and global networks.

The workshop in Salzburg launches a series of four workshops that will take place until 2025 as part of the project, which is funded by the OeAD and Campus France.
