THE AUSTRIAN RESEARCH PLATFORM IN GREECE SINCE 1898

The Athens Branch of the Austrian Archaeological Institute (OeAI) serves the study of the cultural heritage of Greece and the Aegean, which in many ways has become formative for Europe and the world. The branch office forms a central interface between Greece and Austria, as it represents and communicates Austrian research in Greece and vice versa.

The building of the OeAI was constructed according to plans by the architect Ernst Ziller on Leoforos Alexandras near the Greek National Museum and opened in 1908. Today, in addition to office space, it houses a flat for the guests and fellows of the institute as well as a specialist library, which is open to colleagues for study.

The OeAI Athen also provides technical and administrative support for Austrian scholars and students in their research in Greece. It represents Austrian applications for archaeological field research, study permits, material autopsies, analysis of material samples and guide permits for excursions at the Greek Ministry of Culture and Sports.

The OeAI Athens conducts its own research and excavation projects in the northern and western Peloponnese. The urban structure, economic resources and religious identity of the inhabitants of Lousoi in the mountains of Arcadia, diachronic research on the settlement of Aigeira on the Corinthian Gulf and the fortifications and buildings of the small Hellenistic town of Leontion in the hinterland of Achaia are among the main areas of research. A new project started at Kleidi-Samikon on the west coast of the Peloponnese, where an important Poseidon sanctuary was located at a strategically neuralgic site.

SPECIALIST LIBRARY

The library currently contains around 20,000 volumes, and the main focus of the holdings is on the archaeology and history of Greece from prehistory to late antiquity. Apart from some old editions dating back to the beginning of the 20th century, the library particularly represents the research topics of topography, architecture and pottery studies represented at the Institute.

The aim is to make Austrian publications on Greek antiquity and Byzantine history as complete as possible accessible to the specialist public in Athens. The holdings are recorded in the online catalogue of the Vienna University Library.
