

A Glimpse into the Supplement to the *Lexikon zur byzantinischen Gräzität (LBGSup)*

Between 1994 and 2017, the *Lexikon zur byzantinischen Gräzität* was published in a total of eight fascicles. *Corrigenda* and *addenda* were collected over this entire period and beyond. The pages available here provide a first insight into this material.

Lemmata beginning with the letter Eta are presented as specimens of the supplement to the *LBG (LBGSup)*. In 1985, too, the lemmata beginning with η were the first to be published. (E. TRAPP – W. The file presented here is designed to be read online and used together with the [LBGonline](#). References to the online version of the *LBG* as well as abbreviations of the cited text editions are provided with links. The file is also available for download.

Principles

LBGSup contains corrections and additions to references as well as corrections to suggested translations. It lists additional references to entries in the *LBG*, and also presents athesaurista, they are marked with asterisks. We also include word forms that have not been attested so far.

Criteria for selection

The principles of the *LBG* as outlined in the introduction to the first fascicle (see *LBG* Fasc. 1, Einleitung) also apply to the supplement. The chronological frame comprises texts that were written between the 4th and the 15th century.

Structure of the lemmata

The lemmata follow the scheme of the entries in the *LBG* in their structure.

The entire lemma will be presented in its updated form. At the end of each entry is a linked reference to the relevant lemma in *LBGonline*, if applicable. Likewise, the bibliographic abbreviations in the *LBGSup H* file are provided with links. Thus, the respective full citation can be retrieved by clicking on the abbreviation via the literature management tool Zotero. Citations that represent a reference to a new edition are marked by = between the two indications of the publication (see e.g. s.v. ῥηγουμενεῖον [TaktNik](#) 21,33; 69,8 = [TaktNikH](#) 46,8; 136,32). The new editions included in *LBGSup* are those that were cited in earlier *LBG* fascicles according to the older edition and in later *LBG* fascicles according to a new edition. New editions after 2016 are taken into account in a select number of cases (e.g. the edition of the [“Book of Ceremonies”](#) published in 2020).

Relationship to the *TLG*

A reference to the *TLG* is only considered a reason for a supplement in the *LBGSup* if a search in the *TLG* leads to changes in the content of the respective lemma. If the use of the *TLG* results only in an increase in the number of citations, this alone is not a reason for an addition in the *LBGSup*. Thanks to the constantly growing text material in the *TLG*, this is a fluid relationship of which the informed users of the *LBG*, the *LBGSup* and the *TLG* are aware.
